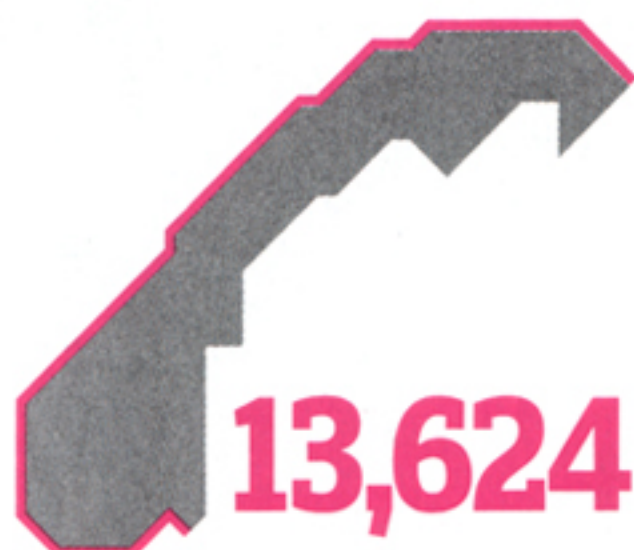
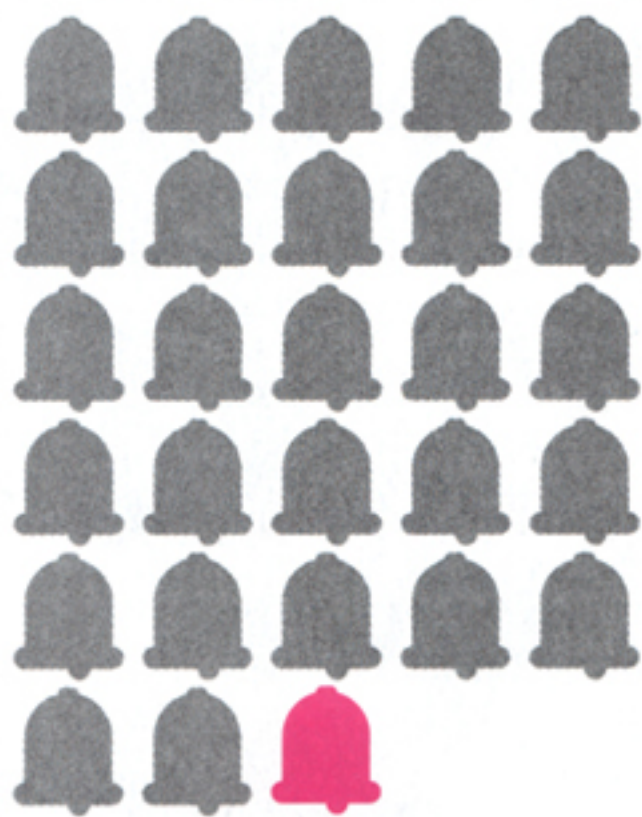


Europe by the Numbers

Number of characters in the longest Welsh town name:

Llanfairpwllglynwyllgo-gerrychwyrndrobwllllan-tysiliogogogoch

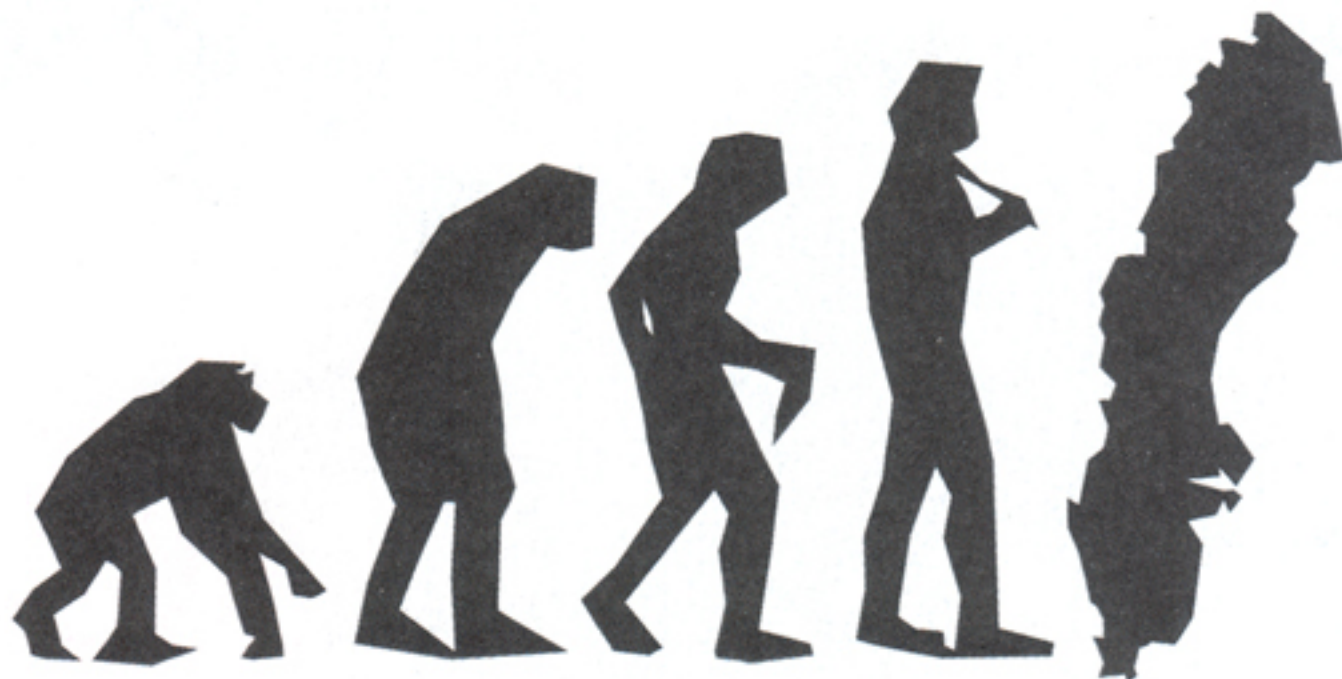
Number of Vatican Citys that would fit in Liechtenstein. (Look, when you're from tiny Liechtenstein, you need something to brag about.)

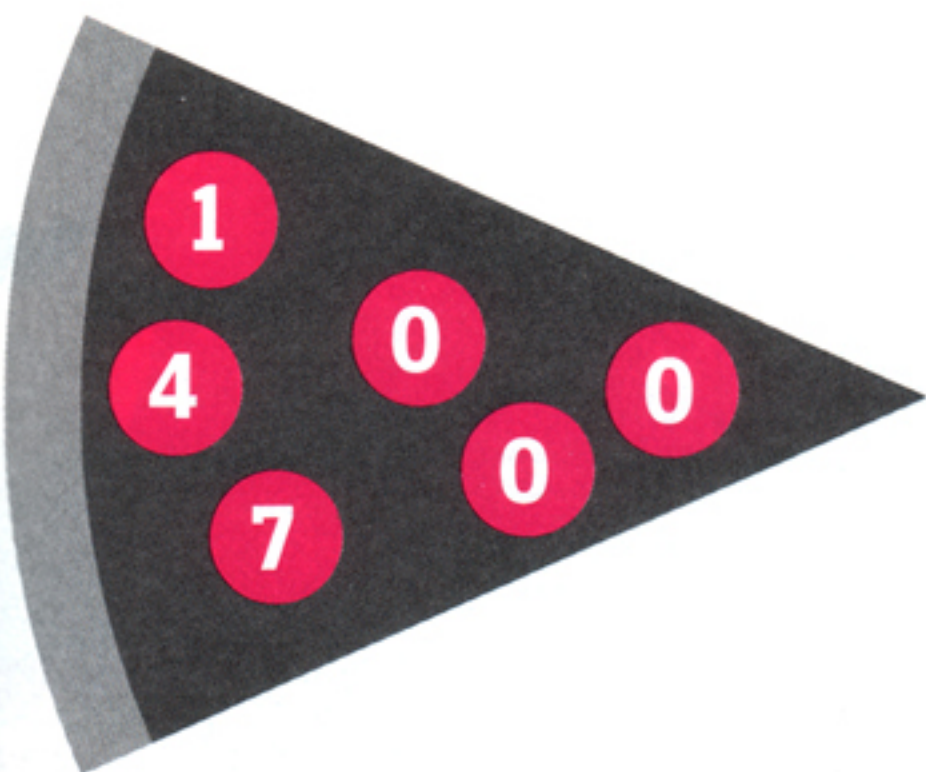
Life expectancy in Sweden and Switzerland, which is the longest in Europe. It's sort of like living in Florida or Arizona (but with more blonds).
